Betty Jane Walser, 90, of Fond du Lac, peacefully entered eternal life on Tuesday, March 27, 2018, at St. Francis Home.

I think just like Betty, during my work life as an OT I have worked full time, part time and pre-diem casual. Adjusting my schedule to fit my family's needs.

Some of my personal fond memories with Betty were camping at Waupun, Square Dancing, hanging out with Snow birds in Texas, playing dominos, prepping for parties and Crafting, always crafting.

I am 100% sure Betty has meet up with Verlyn and my parents as well as few other square dancer friends in heaven and has organized a square dance convention or a well thought out dinner party.
